- Standard wage = wage is paid under precondition that if the employee finishes more than a certain quantity of work within the determined work time, he will receive a bonus for extra work done.
 - Standard time = if the employee finishes his work in a shorter time than the standard or determined time, he will receive a bonus for the time saved.

- School education is important for economic growth. The higher the scholastic level of the labour force, the more productive they are and the more goods and services can be produced. Especially technical education is regarded as an essential factor for economic growth.
 - Post-school education at universities and technicons is necessary to develop the skills necessary for modern economic development. The training of engineers, technicians and technologists is particularly necessary for improving the capacity of the economy to create welfare.
 - In-service training and retraining must be undertaken continually to suit changing circumstances.
 - Vocational guidance must receive much more attention to ensure the maximum utilisation of school leavers.
 - Entrepreneurs must be available to create new job opportunities, as well as goods and services.
 - More management personnel are needed to direct the creation of welfare.
 - Labour must be more effectively utilised at all levels. Peaceful and harmonious labour relations, motivation for work and positive attitudes and a true work ethic are needed to improve the quality of labour. (10)

- Economic order and protection function (2)

In order to maintain internal and external security, the state needs a strong defence force. Terrorism occurs throughout the world and has become a threat to peaceful existence. Much capital is invested in maintaining this security, e.g. the defence, police and prison functions.

Law and order must be maintained in the country - for this purpose, there must be a legal service rendered by courts. (4)
 - Social welfare function

The nature and range of this function will be influenced by the policy of the government.

The functions which have a bearing on social welfare are material (economic) care, keeping fit and in good health, mental stimulation, intellectual development and cultural promotion. The state must also ensure that the disadvantaged are at least able to satisfy their minimum needs. This is social security. Large amounts of money are spent on the physically disabled and other disadvantaged groups each year. These services are rendered because the state is held responsible for the well-being of the nation. (2)
- Social services include:
- Free hospitalisation
 - Family allowances
 - Unemployment insurance
 - Medical services
 - Subsidised pension services
 - Removal of garbage
 - Provision of water and electricity
 - Schools, universities, technical colleges (4)

- Economic welfare function (2)
 - The regulation of the economy and to ensure **economic stability**, e.g. monetary control
 - The stimulation of **economic development** to ensure total wealth, in which every individual can share according to his own contribution, e.g. assistance to future entrepreneurs
 - Maintenance of **economic order**
 - The provision and maintenance of an **economic infrastructure** for the support of the private sector, e.g. public transport services, provision of water and electricity
 - Support private **industrial development** (4)
